Planning Faithfully, Choosing Wisely

When death occurs, what are the first steps that need to be taken?

Whether the person dies at home or in a care facility, contacting a funeral home is an important step. They will come out, attend to the body, and remove the body from its current location. The process of final arrangements then begins. It would be helpful to have decided upon a funeral home prior to death occurring. It is also important to contact the pastor. A meeting soon after the death to plan the types of services needed will help to answer questions and reduce stress and anxiety.

What is the difference between a funeral and memorial service?

Simply put, at a funeral service the body of the deceased is present, whereas at a memorial service either the deceased's ashes or no remains are present. Both services provide an opportunity to proclaim God's death defeating acts in Christ as we remember all that God has given us in the life of our loved one.

What is the Lutheran Church's position on cremation?

Cremation is seen by the Church as a completely viable and appropriate alternative to the traditional burials. The cost of a cremation is significantly less than that of a burial. It is important that early discussions take place to know the person's views on cremation. All funeral homes can assist in cremation arrangements.

What is a visitation?

It is a time for the family members of the deceased to greet and be greeted by friends and acquaintances of the deceased. It is typically done the day prior to the funeral or memorial service or just prior to that service on the same day. Some important questions regarding a visitation are:

How many should be done?

If there is a casket, should it be opened during the visitation?

Where should the visitation take place, the funeral home or the church?

How soon after death does a funeral or memorial service take place?

Funeral services are typically held within three to five days following death, thereby allowing appropriate time for family members and friends to gather for the service. Memorial services can be held any time, but it is recommended they be held within a few weeks.

LCR is unable to hold funeral or memorial services on Sunday.

Where should the funeral or memorial take place?

It is strongly suggested that the service take place in the church sanctuary. That is the place where resurrection and the promise of God's presence have been regularly preached and celebrated. It is much more difficult to celebrate resurrection at a funeral home.

How does a funeral or memorial service get planned?

The pastor will meet with the immediate family and discuss all aspects of the service and burial. It is very helpful if some planning for this time has been done earlier. Emotions are running high at this time; planning ahead can make this time less stressful.

Who is responsible for producing the order of worship & bulletin?

After the service has been planned with the Pastor, the church office will produce the bulletin at no cost to your family.

Who is responsible for submitting the death notice and obituary to the newspaper?

Typically, a funeral director will take care of this for you. There may or may not be additional costs to have the obituary published in certain newspapers.

Who plans the reception following the funeral or memorial service?

If the reception is held at LCR, we have a funeral guild who will assist in making these arrangements at no cost. If you prefer, you can make other or additional arrangements with a caterer.

What is a memorial gift?

Often, in lieu of flowers, the deceased and their family have chosen one or more organization where memorial gifts can be made. It is important and helpful that this decision be made in advance of passing.

Family Visitation

A visitation is an informal gathering for friends and family to express sympathy, view photographs/video tribute, etc. You are invited to consider LCR for the visitation when you work with a professional Funeral Director.
