


MLK's Relationship to Lutheranism

It was a dark February night at about 8:00 pm and class was scheduled to go from 6:00 - 9:00 pm. It was one of my most favorite classes, Voices of Non-Violence, and it had been a long day. We were discussing Martin Luther King, Jr.; all of a sudden, the professor said, "You all do know that Martin Luther King, Jr. was not his given name. He was baptized,

"Michael Luther King, Jr., and his father's given name was Michael Luther King, Sr." What did you say? Really !?! So how did that happen?



While we are aware of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s life-long fight against social injustice and poverty which cost him his life, we may not be as aware of Martin Luther's fight for social reform. In 1519-1520, Luther authored a program that regulated public assistance to the poor, "The Order of the Communal Purse." Over the next forty years, the program evolved to include social organizations such as: hospitals for the poor and elderly; free medical care for the needy; a 'soup kitchen' to feed the needy; interest-free credit of up to 500 gulden to artisans who expanded their business employment; support of a four-year school program for all children, including girls (1525); the holding of interest rates to 4-5% to curb the practice of usury at the expense of the poor.

Luther taught that we, as Christians, have been saved and justified through God's mercy and grace and are responsible to fulfill God's mission to serve others, specifically the poor. The poor are our neighbors to be served through justice and equity and treated with dignity. Serving our neighbor "is an act of faith that is full of love in obedience and for the glory of God out of Christian love."

So having said all of this, please be involved in the weekend of service of January 13-15 to celebrate the humility and love of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and embrace his teachings which were similar in value to our Lutheran heritage. Shepherd's Staff Ministry Shares Care Packages at the Holidays



As part of the guidelines for the welcoming of a new pastor, the ELCA highly recommends that a Mutual Ministry Team be in place to serve as a resource and a support system to the new pastor assisting in his/her overall acclimation to the church. This will include but not be limited to listening to the new pastor's questions and concerns, advisement about situations/interests within the congregation, offering guidance with respect to the church leaders and support staff's engagement, and offering fellowship to the new pastor. They shall meet with the new pastor on a regular basis (usually once a month) in a prayerful environment to discuss LCR, its mission, and its vision.

In response to these guidelines, a Mutual Ministry Team has been developed to assist Pastor Rich Leseganich in his acclimation to LCR upon his arrival on January 25th. Life Line Screening goes beyond regular checkups to look inside your arteries for signs of plaque build-up

Carotid Artery Disease:

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD):

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.1

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA):

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, stroke, and heart failure. which is a life-threatening medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation:

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation, AFib can lead to blood clots. and other heart-related complications.2
